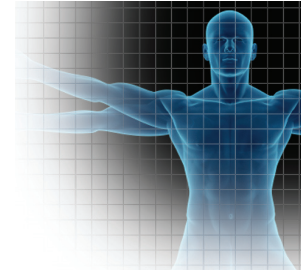

Keynote Address: "Multi-Disciplinary Simulation: Is It Worth the Time?"

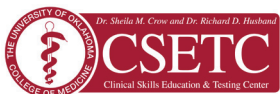
Kim Leighton is the dean of educational technology at BryanLGH College of Health Sciences. She coordinates use of high fidelity simulation, collaborating with nursing, nurse anesthesia, and health professions faculty to integrate simulation throughout the curriculum. She also assists nurse managers from the medical center to create simulated learning opportunities for new graduates, new hires, seasoned nurses and annual competency assessments.

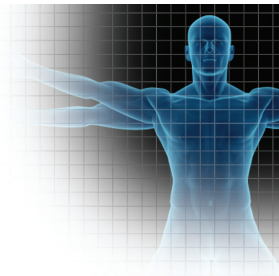
Dr. Leighton is also adjunct faculty for Medical Education Technologies, Inc. (METI). She provides consultation with nursing schools in the US and Canada on curriculum integration of simulation utilizing the program for Nursing Curriculum Integration, a product she helped to develop while working as a full-time clinical educator for METI. Dr. Leighton works on a variety of projects related to online simulation and skills development, and is a research consultant on various grants.

She recently received an award from the Society for Simulation in Healthcare (SSH) for her hard work on bridging the gap among organizations. As president of the International Nursing Association for Clinical Simulation Learning (INACSL), she facilitates organizations, such as INACSL and SSH to work together along with facilitating international partnering.

Dr. Leighton's interests lie in improving the simulation environment to meet the learning needs of undergraduate nursing students, with a strong emphasis on improving skills of the facilitator. She teaches three graduate courses that make up the online Certificate in Simulation Education program. She completed her education at the University of Nebraska Medical Center, Nebraska Wesleyan University, and the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, where she obtained her PhD in Educational Leadership in Higher Education.

Session #1: Leveraging the Potential of Game-Based Learning for Clinical Education

Eric B. Bauman, PhD, RN, Paramedic • Clinical Playground, LLC • Middleton, WI

Dr. Bauman received his PhD from the University of Wisconsin-Madison School of Education, Department of Curriculum and Instruction in 2007. He was one of the early Games+Learning+Society students and was advised by professors Betty Hayes and Kurt Squire, both renowned scholars in the game-based learning movement. Dr. Bauman is an RN, firefighter and paramedic with more than 20 years of clinical, research, and teaching experience who recently held a faculty associate appointment in the Department of Anesthesiology at the University of Wisconsin – Madison, before starting Clinical Playground LLC, a consulting service focusing on game and simulation-based learning.

Session #2: Standardized Patients: The Highest Level of Fidelity

Rhonda Sparks, MD • OU Clinical Skills Education and Testing Center • Oklahoma City, OK

Dr. Sparks is the medical director of the Sheila M. Crow and Richard D. Husband Clinical Skills Education and Testing Center (CSETC). Her efforts are concentrated on providing medical students with innovative and highly instructional patient contact experiences during their first two years of medical school to prepare them for clinical rotations, residency and clinical practice. Dr. Sparks has initiated intensive training and feedback programs to ensure that the standardized patient experience matches as closely as possible, the experience medical students, residents and practicing physicians will face during their medical career.

Session #3: Simulation Collaboration in Education

W. Stephen Eddy, DO, MPH • OSU Center for Health Science, College of Osteopathic Medicine • Tulsa, OK

Since 2005, Dr. Eddy has diligently served as the director of continuing medical education at the Oklahoma State University Center for Health Science (OSUCHS) in the College of Osteopathic Medicine. He is board certified in family medicine and serves as a professor of family medicine for the department of family medicine at OSUCHS. Dr. Eddy's expertise includes the area of clinical skills, with 27 years of experience established from the various roles of being a coordinator, lecturer and lab instructor.

Working as a laboratory coordinator for Tulsa Technology Health Sciences Center, Ms. Robinson has a health sciences background with 19 years of experience with patients, students and health care providers through hands-on involvement in educational programs and direct patient care. She coordinates clinical labs, which contributes to teaching students in 13 different health-related occupations. Ms. Robinson is also involved in the development and administration of laboratory experiences and clinical practical exams using a wide variety of delivery systems including simulation technology and e-learning systems.

She has broad experience in the basic sciences and applied clinical research and a special interest in mobile technology and health promotion interventions.

With a background as a firefighter and paramedic she is one of the founding pioneers for the CFS which is recognized as a frontrunner in simulation for emergency medical training and the DMI for its efforts in multidisciplinary simulation training in preparing for major disasters. She has vision, enthusiasm and dedication, coupled with a hands on approach and practical experience which has made the colleges simulation training realistic and educational. Ms. Anderson is recognized as a thought leader in the nation for simulation preparedness.

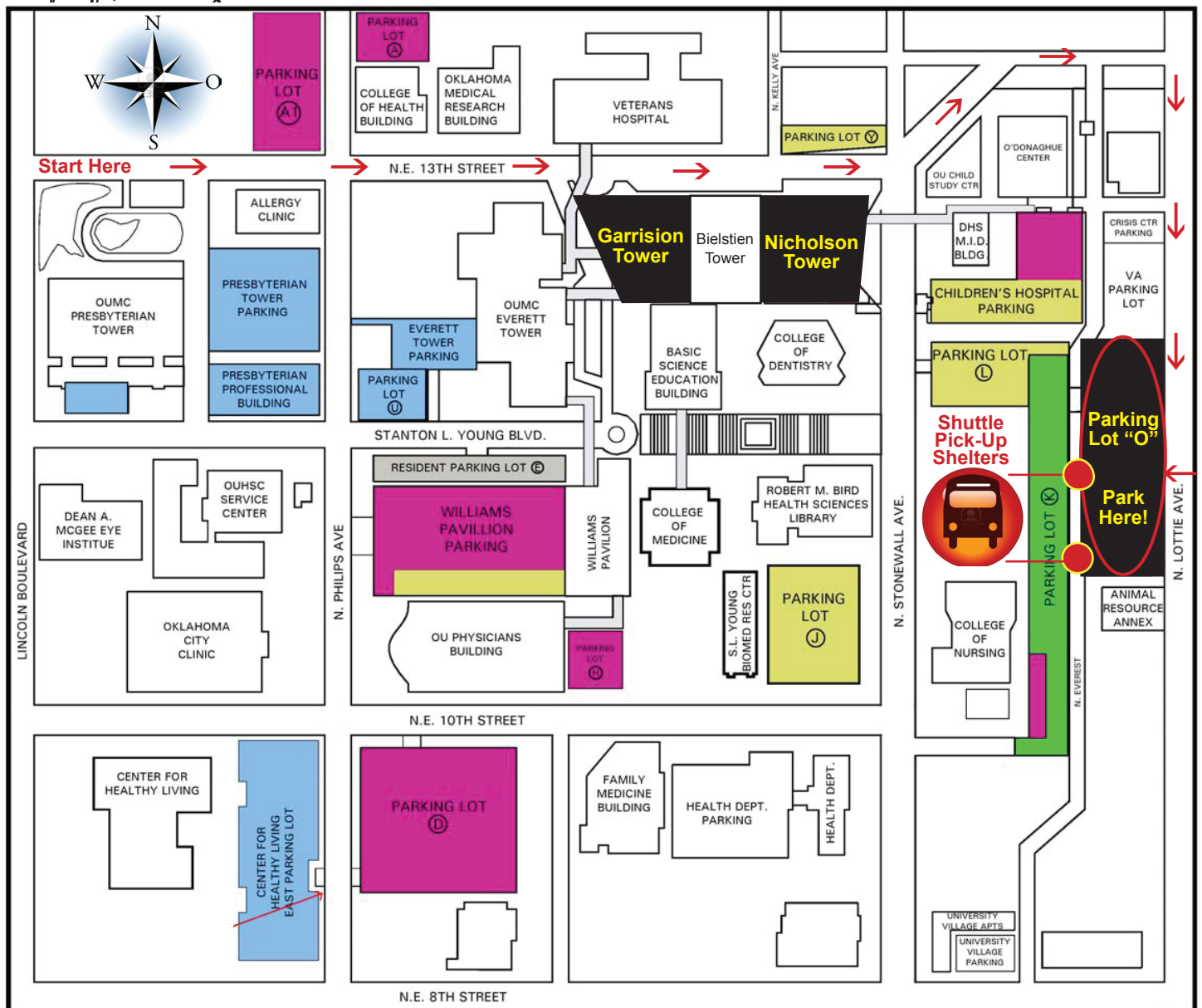
- Take NE 13th St. to N. Lottie Ave. (You will pass the following streets: Lincoln Blvd., Phillips Ave. and Stonewall Ave.)
- Turn right (south) onto N. Lottie Ave.
- Go past first parking lot entrance, which will read "VA Parking Only."
- Take the next right (west) turn into the parking lot. The gate will be open, so you will not pull a ticket.
- Park and then walk to the west side of the parking lot to one of the two shuttle pick-up shelters (marked on map).
- The shuttle runs every 10 minutes and will drop passengers in front of Nicholson Tower.

An Important Note... The pre-conference and the simulation conference are in different locations.

Pre-conference (May 24): After being dropped off by the shuttle in front of Nicholson Tower, attendees must go to Garrison Tower (It is a short 1/8 of a block walk and located one tower away from Nicholson Tower as indicated on the map in black/yellow.) In Garrison Tower, go to the elevators and go to the 6th Floor, Suite 6200, to the OU Clinical Skills Education and Teststing Center.

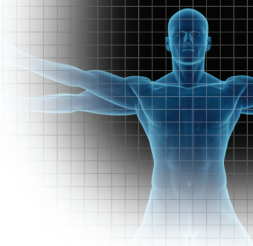
